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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

College is affiliated with Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and strictly adheres to the curriculum developed by the affiliated college. The institution ensures effective program delivery through a well-planned and documented process to achieve academic excellence and professional competence through the introduction

of academic flexibility measures.

The college has integrated cross-cutting issues on gender, environment and sustainable development, human values ??and professional ethics into the curriculum. The science, humanities, home sciences and economics degree programs include all of the above subjects in their curriculum. In economics and management subjects, chapters on professional ethics are offered. The topic of gender equality is dealt with in the humanities degree program. Human values ??are taught in the humanities and social sciences. Environment and sustainable development are dealt with in the environmental sciences and in the life sciences. Curricular Aspects

The students who live near the area of the college are economically weak. The parents belong to the economically backward class. Majority of them are farmers. Agricultural field has to face huge natural & other calamities regularly. So it is difficult for the students to pay the fees. Consequently, the students are deprived of education.

Taking into account the miserable condition of such students, the college has started 'Educational fee concession Scheme' with the guidance of Hon'ble Shailendra Sudhakar Sonaje. The needy students are given the concession in the fees or the 50% fees are relaxed in this scheme. Fee concessions are given to meritorious & sports students. Some students are allowed to pay the fees in installments.

Since the adoption of the village by the college, various activities have been carried out including elimination of superstitions, equality between men and women, water conservation, tree plantation, adult education, plastic free village, providing information to the farmers of the village on modern sowing techniques, climate change, and providing information on climate and NSS. They conduct such social activities by taking camps. Farmers are given guidance on the damage of agricultural land from chemical farming and how organic farming is useful for it, and how vermicomposting project is useful for it and how to prepare vermicomposting project. Farmers are given free vermicomposting from the vermicomposting project of the college, and also the importance of organic farming to the students of the college village. Explain to the farmers. The college provides information on climate and environment to the farmers in the village to mitigate the changes in the climate and its impact on agriculture. The college is conducting NSS CAMP in the village and the students are doing water conservation work in large numbers in the village. The students are creating public awareness through the medium of street theater for getting rid of plastic, elimination of superstitions and equality between men and women. The village has also received an award from the Government of Maharashtra as a result of the tireless hard work of the college and Kandhane village.

The institution ensures effective program delivery through a well-planned and documented process to achieve academic excellence and professional competence through the introduction of academic flexibility measures. Academic planning:

- At the beginning of the academic year, the director sets the academic calendar in collaboration with all department heads.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The college has integrated cross-cutting issues on gender, environment and sustainable development, human values ??and professional ethics into the curriculum. The science, humanities, home sciences and economics degree programs include all of the above subjects in their curriculum. In economics and management subjects, chapters on professional ethics are offered. The topic of gender equality is dealt with in the humanities degree program. Human values ??are taught in the humanities and social sciences. Environment and sustainable development are dealt with in the environmental sciences and in the life sciences. The students learn this subject with the same enthusiasm as other content.

In addition to the regular teaching of these topics, the college has other mechanisms for dealing with these topics that support the teaching of course content. After approval, a gender audit is carried out annually. On average, the college has a near-equal student-to-faculty ratio."Vishakha" is a women's welfare committee that works effectively to investigate harassment of girls and female employees, if any. Health awareness programs are conducted annually at the college.

These programs sensitize students to the gender issues taught in the curriculum. In the fourth semester of all faculties, environmental studies is a compulsory subject in which students receive detailed information on the subject of the environment. To provide a participatory learning experience, the Institute ran various programs to educate students about environmental sustainability. The "Forest Conservation Day" is celebrated every year on July 23rd to sensitize students to the importance of forest conservation and its ecological importance. Ozone Day is celebrated times a year on September 16th. At the same time, the college practically follows it and has a "Green Campus". We have also installed a solar system at the college, which saves energy, money and labour.

As part of teaching human values ??to students, students receive information through various platforms and programs. NSS Unit helps students understand the importance of community needs. These two units help students develop character, discipline, leadership, and worldly perspectives. National Yoga Day is celebrated on June 21st every year. The "Disease Prevention Awareness" program will start on September 26th. Along with this "Women's Empowerment Workshop" was held in zodage where various topics related to women's empowerment were discussed. Almost all faculties are working on raising awareness of various social issues. The Entrepreneurship Cell is of great help in providing students with professional skills and a platform to explore their creativity. All of these platforms are additional frameworks for understanding and acquiring knowledge about the topics covered in the program.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The institution's internal evaluation mechanism is transparent and robust. It conforms to the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune (SPPU) regulations and guidelines for the internal assessment process of theoretical and practical subjects. At the beginning of an academic session, the college sets up an internal evaluation committee to effectively conduct the internal evaluation of the students. In coordination with

all department heads, the internal evaluation committee draws up an annual program for the proper implementation of the internal evaluation. Students and parents are made aware of the internal assessment and review process during the orientation/integration program.

The internal evaluation program is drawn up and published on the university's website and distributed to employees and students. The internal evaluation program is communicated to the students in the class by the subject teachers one week in advance. The examination papers and the evaluation system are created by the professors of the subject in accordance with the curriculum and the guidelines of the college. The department's internal examinations coordinator and HOD moderate questionnaires after reviewing the syllabus and course results. To ensure transparency, students must record their answers in answer books provided by the college.

Internal assessment begins in class with unit tests. Two internal assessment tests are carried out for each subject in accordance with the university guidelines. The grades achieved in the internal evaluation tests are shown on the evaluation sheets. Throughout the academic year, student performance is evaluated through submitted term papers, project work, seminar presentations, group discussions, field trips, case studies, and practical work.

Subject teachers correct answer sheets and advise students on how to improve their answers. The correct answer sheets are provided to the students for general observation. The transparency of the internal evaluation is guaranteed by publication in the faculty register. In the event of a complaint, the students should contact the lecturers of their subject to have them corrected. Subject teachers solve students' problems related to assessment and grades. If the student is not satisfied, the matter goes to the head of the department.

At the end of the internal evaluation process, the answer books, assignments, projects, survey reports, case studies, field visit reports are collected and kept in the departments. Advanced mentoring, academic calendar, complaints management and internal assessments are practiced to ensure internal assessment transparency.

Written test, practical test, multiple choice question (MCQ), online exam, quiz competition, homework submission, project reports, seminar presentation, group discussion, survey methods, study visit, visits and site visits are methods of internal evaluation.

The guidelines of the Savitribai Phule University Of Pune assign a weight of 30% to internal evaluation and an 70% weight to external evaluation in the form of internal and external examinations. The college appointed an experienced Senior Teacher to serve as the RAC's coordinator.

The college's RAC regularly encouraged teachers to apply for grants from various funding agencies and to attend various conferences, seminars, and intellectual activities. During this evaluation period, the College organized 03 state, several regional and university seminars and workshops.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

1.The Context

Sandip College Zodage is a rural college and majority of students come from rural areas. Accordingly, the college implements various schemes in the villages. From the academic year 2016-17 the college has adopted the village of Kandhane Taluka Malegaon (Nashik) which is 04 KM from the college. Over the last few decades, the government has launched various welfare, upliftment schemes and awareness programs for the rural people, and to implement them and reach the last person of the society, encouraging the use of modern cases for agriculture. But due to lack of effective implementation and result oriented mechanism, the desired objective could not be achieved. The overall progress of the villagers living in remote areas is still hindered by various factors. Due to lack of information, ignorance and awareness programs, the life of these villagers is still surrounded by various problems. Awareness campaign has been organized to change the attitude of the villagers on certain issues like illiteracy, health problems related to unhygienic living conditions, superstitious attitudes, adherence to traditional methods of agriculture, neglect of banking system etc

1.The Practice

Since the adoption of the village by the college, various activities have been carried out including elimination of superstitions, equality between men and women, water conservation, water conservation, tree plantation, adult education, plastic free village, providing information to the farmers of the village on modern sowing techniques, climate change, and providing information on climate and NSS. They conduct such social activities by taking camps. Farmers are given guidance on the damage of agricultural land from chemical farming and how organic farming is useful for it, and how vermicomposting project is useful for it and how to prepare vermicomposting project. Farmers are given free vermicomposting from the vermicomposting project of the college, and also the importance of organic farming to the students of the college village
